Dear Honorable Members of the Ohio House & Senate:

The Logan-Union-Champaign Regional Planning Commission (LUC) is a voluntary, three county organization. **Our membership includes several of the townships and municipalities within each of the respective counties, a membership total of 66 local governments.** Since our founding in the 1960s, LUC continues to serve and advise our members in planning initiatives and land use decisions.

Our 1970 Regional Plan stresses the importance of regional recreation facilities and the availability of those facilities to the public. The demands of people are not met by just the local park or meeting house, but by a combination of services available regionally in the several townships, villages, and cities.

To emphasize the level of collaboration and cooperation, you will see signatures on this letter from LUC, but also from the **County Engineers** and **the mayors of the three municipalities (Bellefontaine-West Liberty-Urbana) along the trail**.

Existing Trails.

Grassroots and State-level support has been critical to the success of trail construction in our region. In the early 2000s, the bike path from Clark County was extended in Champaign County. **Most recently, the bike path was extended into Logan County, through West Liberty to Bellefontaine.** This important regional asset is possible because of community leaders, local governments, non-profits, private donations and fundraising, corporate sponsors, volunteers, and strong community support.

Our organization recently became one of the State's six Rural Transportation Planning Organizations (RTPOs). **LUC has collected bike path data and observed high counts relative to the population of our rural communities.** Our counter, in June, at our Bellefontaine location reported over 2,000 counts and our counters, in June, at each of our Urbana locations also reported over 2,000 counts.

Planning Documents Support the Project.

Our organization is involved in land use planning activities, including local and State-level transportation planning activities. This project is incorporated into State, regional, and county plans.

- <u>State Bike Route System.</u> This trail is designated State Bike Route 23. The goal of this network is to provide bicyclists with safe and convenient connections through and to population centers and destinations in Ohio, serving as a strong backbone that local and regional bike networks can build on and connect across the State.
- <u>LUC Regional Transportation Plan (2015 + 2023) & Champaign County Comprehensive Plan</u> <u>Update (2020).</u> The LUC Regional Transportation Plan for Logan & Champaign counties supports

surfacing of the existing trail. Champaign County's Comprehensive Plan Update also supports surfacing of the existing trail; the public survey performed as part of the Update indicated 72.26% of respondents utilized parks and bike paths with strong, majority support for extending and maintaining the bike path.

Strategic Investment.

This is not a pilot project, and it is not an attempt to set monies aside for a generic or general purpose. This rural bike path is a proven, local success story. After extending the trail from Urbana to Bellefontaine using aggregate, it was planned to be chip-sealed and eventually completed with a final course. The aggregate course is complete. The chip-seal is complete. The request is for assistance with the final course.

My name is Louis Agresta and I am the Transportation Director for the Clark County Springfield-TCC. The TCC is the Metropolitan Planning Organization for Clark County, Ohio. We utilize Federal, State, and Local dollars for transportation planning activities that help create a safe, effective transportation network for our community. In addition to serving as the MPO in Clark County, we also serve as the ODOT funded Regional Transportation Planning Organization planning partner for LUC. In this capacity we provide transportation planning services for LUC. The Simon Kenton Trail asphalt paving project is an important project not just to Logan and Champaign County, but our entire region.

The Simon Kenton Trail is a part of a much larger multi-use trail network throughout the Miami Valley Region. This network is the largest paved trail network in the United States with over 340 miles of paved trails that connect communities all across the Miami Valley. The Simon Kenton Trail is a part of a trail network that directly connects Bellefontaine to Cincinnati. The section from Bellefontaine to Urbana is not asphalt and limits ridership in the northern Miami Valley. Once funded, I believe that northern Miami Valley communities like Springfield, Urbana, West Liberty, and Bellefontaine will experience increases in bicycle tourism.

I am writing a Letter of Support on behalf of Community Health & Wellness Partners (CHWP), a Federally Qualified Health Center with eight sites located in Champaign and Logan Counties of Ohio. CHWP provides a whole-person, whole community approach to their patients by offering primary care with integrated behavioral health and ancillary services. CHWP supports events at the bike path as it promotes exercise and a healthy lifestyle. The bike path route runs directly in front of our Urbana Community Health Center location. It is with great pride that I share the bike path is utilized regularly by all ages of the communities and throughout the year.

Our community has worked tirelessly to connect Logan and Champaign counties to the bike trail network, so residents can ride their bike from the highest point in Ohio at Campbell Hill near Bellefontaine (1,549' above sea level) to the lowest point in Ohio at the Ohio River near Cincinnati in Hamilton County (455' above sea level). The Urbana-Bellefontaine Connector was constructed as aggregate (2015) and later upgraded to chip-seal (ca. 2017). We hope to see this upgraded, finally, to a hot-mix asphalt.

By funding this project, it would be the finishing touch to our trail, enabling our community to upgrade the trail section between Bellefontaine-West Liberty-Urbana. **This request would upgrade the pavement from chip-seal to a final course of hot-mix asphalt, perform work to resolve geometric and drainage issues, improve connections, and add bike path railing (where warranted by the technical memorandum)**. This would make the trail accessible to more riders and make it a smoother ride, improving a trail that is both on the State Bike Route System and in our community.

The upgraded hot-mix asphalt will be safer for all, and even utilized by those of ambulatory challenges. I hope you will support this project because the path is easily accessible throughout Logan and Champaign Counties and promotes mental and physical health for everyone.



We own and operate LeVan's Excavating, Inc. (LEI), located in Logan County, Ohio. We have proudly served Logan and its surrounding counties for 29 years, and we strive to improve the area with every project we complete, including the **Urbana-Bellefontaine Connector**.

Existing Trail.

Our community has worked tirelessly to connect Logan and Champaign counties to the bike trail network so residents can ride their bike from the highest point in Ohio at Campbell Hill near Bellefontaine (1,549' above sea level) to the lowest point in Ohio at the Ohio River near Cincinnati in Hamilton County (455' above sea level). The Urbana-Bellefontaine Connector was constructed as aggregate (2015) and later upgraded to chip-seal (ca. 2017). We hope to see this upgraded, finally, to a hot-mix asphalt.

Strategic Investment.

If you fund this project, it would be the finishing touch to our trail, enabling our community to upgrade the trail section between Bellefontaine-West Liberty-Urbana. This request would upgrade the pavement from chip-seal to a final course of hot-mix asphalt, perform work to resolve geometric and drainage issues, improve connections, and add bike path railing (where warranted by the technical memorandum). 

My name is Louis Agresta and I am the Secretary Treasurer for the West Central Ohio Port Authority (WESTCO). WESTCO was founded in 1991 to preserve rail assets in Clark, Fayette, and Champaign counties that otherwise would have fallen into disrepair after private industry abandoned the line. Today, our shortline railroad is thriving with several customers and over 7,000 annual carloads. We serve a variety of industries including plastics, agriculture, scrap metal, automotive, and timber just to name a few.

The Simon Kenton mutli-use trail was built on WESTCO owned property. Our Board of Directors approved a long-term lease in the early 2000s for the trails construction. Although our primary focus is to provide freight services to our region, we also value in community projects such as the Simon Kenton Trail. The section of the Simon Kenton Trail in question is the only section that is not asphalt in our region. I would like to see funds awarded to this project so that an already great community asset could be made even better.

The story of WESTCO is something that I am proud to be a part of. Our railroad was on close to being abandoned. Because of the thoughtfulness of community leaders decades ago, a very important transportation corridor was preserved for our community. This corridor not only moves trains, but it also moves people via bicycling and walking. Providing an asphalt surface along the Simon Kenton Trail will increase the viability of walking in biking in this important transportation corridor. It is my sincere hope that this project will be funded at the statewide level for the reasons mentioned above.
