The following are items for discussion at the May 8, 2025 LUC Executive Committee Meeting.

FY2026-FY2029 RTIP Resolution Approval

The Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) development cycle has concluded. The RTIP is a four-year planning document developed to reflect the transportation investment priorities of the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) within LUC's planning region. The document serves as the key planning document used to reflect the transportation planning efforts of the region. The final document is on the LUC website for viewing and was submitted to ODOT on April 30. Staff is requesting final approval from the LUC Executive Committee so that it will be approved and ready for implementation beginning July 1, 2025.

FY2026 Planning Work Program Approval

The FY 2026 Planning Work Program was submitted to ODOT for review in early March. Staff received minor editorial comments from ODOT and made those changes for the final draft. Staff is requesting Executive Committee approval. Once approved, the document will be in effect from July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026.

The Planning Work Program documents the transportation planning activities and priorities for the Logan-Champaign planning area for the upcoming fiscal year. The PWP outlines what work will be done, who will do it, and how it will be paid for. The final PWP can be viewed on the LUC website.

Logan County Trail Feasibility Study

The stakeholder and consultant team continues to work on the Logan County Trail Feasibility Study. The final stakeholder meeting to review the draft memo was held on April 21, 2025. After that meeting, the consultant team will work on finalizing the recommendations for the study per the comments that were received at the 4/21/2025 meeting.

WHEREAS, the Logan-Union-Champaign Regional Planning Commission (LUC) is designated as the Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) for Logan and Champaign counties by the Governor of the State of Ohio, acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), and in cooperation with locally elected officials in the area pursuant to an Agreement between ODOT and LUC; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Work Program establishes the methodologies and budget to implement the areawide transportation planning process and program activities for the upcoming fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Work Program is prepared in cooperation with local government, operators of publicly-owned transit, the Ohio Department of Transportation and the U.S. Department of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, LUC has reviewed the Fiscal Year 2026 Planning Work Program and budget and finds the prescribed elements to be consistent with the development and maintenance of a comprehensive Transportation Plan and short-range programs for the area.

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Appendix – Title VI Compliance Questionnaire	

This report was prepared in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration, the Ohio Department of Transportation, and the local governments of Logan, Union, and Champaign Counties.

The preparation and publication of this document was financed cooperatively by the Federal Highway Administration, the Federal Transit Administration, the Ohio Department of Transportation, and the local governments of Logan, Union, and Champaign Counties.

The contents of this Plan reflect the views of the Logan-Union-Champaign Regional Planning Commission, which is responsible for the facts and the accuracy of the data presented herein. The contents do not necessarily reflect the official view and policies of the Ohio Department of Transportation or the U.S. Department of Transportation. This Plan does not constitute a standard, specification or regulation.



The Commission was formed primarily as a result of the announcement by Governor Rhodes and The Ohio State University Officials that the Transportation Research Center of Ohio would be located straddling the Logan and Union County Line. This 8,100-acre facility was touted to be the world's largest automotive research center. Several studies indicated that a lot of growth and development would take place around the TRC, which would result in an influx of people, business, and industry. Therefore, local officials felt that a Planning Commission should be formed to start planning for the orderly development of the three counties.

The Commission elected Eugene Amrine from Marysville as its first president. The Commission met at the Masonic Temple in North Lewisburg on a monthly basis during 1967 and 1968. The Ohio Department of Development, Division of Planning, under the direction of Paul Baldridge and Patrick Meeker contracted with L-U-C as the consultant to develop the first Comprehensive Plan for the three counties. This effort took two years to complete.

The first office for the Commission was located in a former residence along US Route 33 on the site of the TRC. Carmen Scott of Bellefontaine was hired as the recording secretary in April 1968 to take minutes of the monthly meetings. In November 1968 the Commission decided to hire a full-time director and Carmen was selected from eight applicants for the position. The monthly meetings were then moved to the Masonic Temple in East Liberty. In 1970 the office was moved into the west half of the East Liberty Restaurant Building. It remained there until August 1972, when it moved into the former Knights of Pythias building in East Liberty. In 2017, the office moved to the James A. Rhodes Conference Center at TRC. During the early 1970's, the Commission met on a quarterly basis at various locations throughout the three counties. In the mid- 1970's, the Commission began having annual meetings at the Ohio Hi-Point Joint Vocational School. Between 2003 and 2016, the Commission's annual meeting rotated between the three counties, and it is now held at the Conference Center.

The membership in the Commission is determined by the by-laws. Participating villages, cities, and counties are permitted to have a certain number of representatives. The first village to become a member was North Lewisburg in March 1967, followed by St. Paris, Quincy, DeGraff, and Richwood. In 1986 other municipalities began to join. The first township to join the Commission was Liberty Township, Union County in September 1967. Over the years all 43 townships have become members. As a result, there are 95 people representing the various political subdivisions on the Regional Planning Commission. An Executive Committee consisting of 24 people is elected from the general membership at the Annual Meeting. This committee meets monthly and is the decision and policy making group for the Commission.



The Commission is charged under Ohio Law with certain responsibilities. Among them are the review and approval of subdivisions located in the unincorporated areas and the review and recommendation to township zoning commissions concerning zoning amendments. The Commission also acts as an Area-Wide Clearinghouse for applicants who request federal and state assistance for selected projects. Assistance is rendered to township and municipal zoning and planning commissions regarding zoning and subdivision development.

The Commission and several of its members have been actively involved in the attraction of new business and industry to the area and in the improvement of US Route 33, 68 and other infrastructure improvements. The Commission is funded by the villages, cities, and townships of the three counties and by the three counties themselves on a per capita basis.

Organization of the Regional Planning Commission

The Regional Planning Commission is composed of one member from each of the three boards of county commissioners and the county engineers of each county. In addition, six county "members-at-large" are appointed by the boards of county commissioners, two from each county. Nine "citizen members-at-large" are appointed by the boards of county commissioners, three from each county. Municipalities of city status have two representatives and an alternate. Participating villages have one representative and an alternate. Participating townships have one representative.

The LUC Office has moved from the center of East Liberty back to TRC. Currently, there are three counties, four cities, 18 incorporated villages and 41 townships listed as members of the commission.

The Executive Committee is presently comprised of the president, first and second vice presidents, secretary, treasurer and twenty-five other people who were elected from the entire membership at the annual meeting. Ex-officio members without voting privileges include the District Deputy Directors of the Ohio Department of Transportation's Districts Six and Seven and any chairman of a Study Committee who is not an elected member of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee is the policy and decision-making body, but their actions are always subject to review by the entire commission at any annual or special meeting.



The Executive Committee meets the second Thursday of each month at 1:15 pm in the LUC office at TRC. Representatives from any of the member municipalities or townships are always welcome to attend any or all meetings and participate in any discussion. They are, however, not permitted to vote as a member of the Executive Committee unless they are a duly elected member thereof. Minutes of all Executive Committee meetings are available to all members.

The Annual Meeting of the entire membership is held the third Thursday of November in the evening. The annual dinner typically consists of a dinner prior to the business portion of the meeting. All representatives are encouraged to attend this meeting and participate in any discussion and vote on any issue.

Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO)

In July 2013, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) initiated a Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) two-year pilot program with five multi-county planning organizations including LUC. The RTPO planning area covers only Logan and Champaign Counties even though this RTPO is identified as (LUC). This pilot program provided LUC with funding to conduct regional transportation planning in coordination with local stakeholders, Ohio Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO's), and ODOT. Federal transportation guidance encourages RTPO's to enhance rural area local governments' participation in "the planning, coordination, and implementation of statewide strategic long-range transportation plans and transportation improvement programs."

The initial focus of the RTPO planning program was to establish the first ever long-range multi-modal transportation plans for these regions, develop transportation databases, and become knowledgeable about local government transportation funding programs. On January 27, 2016, Governor John Kasich formally designated LUC as an Ohio RTPO. This designation formalizes the program that started as a pilot and will help spur better and more informed transportation decision making in Ohio.

CCSTCC has been conducting the metropolitan transportation planning process as the MPO for the Springfield urbanized area since 1964. The current staff has a broad mix of experience across multiple transportation planning disciplines and will be able to provide that expertise to LUC and its staff. As an MPO, CCSTCC will be able to provide LUC with templates for many planning activities common between MPO's and RTPO's, including short and long range plans. These plans are captured in the work elements of this document. Both LUC and CCSTCC



benefit from this interregional cooperation, and believe it can be a statewide model for sharing and bolstering resources.

As the RTPO, LUC will carry out the cooperative, comprehensive and continuing transportation planning process via planning services provided by CCSTCC. LUC will maintain this planning process through the work elements developed annually in this Planning Work Program (PWP). The PWP describes the work necessary to maintain the transportation planning process and serves as the budgeting mechanism. The transportation planning process implemented through the PWP will be used to address the goals and objectives as defined in the 2023 LUC Long Range Transportation Plan:

Transportation Safety

- Improve and maintain safety of roadway network, reducing the number of crashes in the area and striving to fall within the nation's average range of crash data.
 - o Identify high crash areas.
 - o Identify traffic safety improvement.
 - Create and implement a signage plan to assist in wayfinding, speed regulation, and traffic control.
 - Evaluate existing signage for conformance to current standards in high crash areas (intersection and curves)

Network Connectivity, Reliability & Efficiency

- Evaluate and improve the highway network to promote safe, reliable, and efficient travel for all road users.
 - o Evaluate crash data and traffic volume to identify areas of improvement.
 - Evaluate the need for additional infrastructure at intersections with high traffic volumes.
 - Assess local congestion and discuss infrastructure improvements.
 - o Perform feasibility study of congestion alleviation opportunities.
 - o Preserve and maintain the existing transportation network.
 - o Electric vehicles Study alternative fuel projects.

Multimodal Access

• Improve and expand the public transportation network and non-motorized transportation options to allow easy mobility to all residents and visitors.



- o Create a comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan for the two counties.
- o Identify bicycle-pedestrian connections within activity centers such as schools, hospitals, shopping areas, universities, etc.
- o Evaluate trip data for current public transportation.

Economic Vitality

- Improve economic growth in the region by providing transportation options that support existing businesses and encourage new economic development opportunities.
 - Ensure that large manufacturing businesses in the region have adequate access to the freight infrastructure network.
 - Facilitate the movement of goods into and out of the area and improve the mobility of all freight modes.
 - o Employee to work transportation.

Stewardship

• Commit to the future and longevity of the transportation network by evaluating the social, environmental, and financial circumstances surrounding each project.

Infrastructure Investment Jobs Act (IIJA)

Implementation of activities consistent with the IIJA will be a priority. CCSTCC Staff will review statewide planning performance measures with ODOT and public transit providers, and integrate some performance based planning activities into the Long Range Transportation Plan and Transportation Improvement Program. CCSTCC Staff will use the following to inform the transportation planning process:

- Planning level environmental mitigation activities;
- Planning level consultation of agencies responsible for land use management, natural resources, environmental protection, conservation, and historic preservation;
- Coordinate consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;
- Development and maintenance of management strategies to improve the performance of the existing transportation facilities to relieve vehicular congestion and maximize the safety and mobility of people and goods;
- Coordination with interested parties as outlined in the LUC RTPO Public Participation Plan (see Work Element 697.1).

System Preservation

CCSTCC Staff will work with local governments and transportation related non-profit agencies on developing and prioritizing transportation projects for federal-aid and state funds as a part of their respective capital improvement planning. The various management systems will be employed in this regard. CCSTCC Staff will assist with Federal-aid and other grant applications to secure funding for bridge and roadway projects that preserve the roadway system.

Highway Safety and Congestion

Short range planning activities will have an emphasis on safety and congestion initiatives, management systems and other modes. CCSTCC Staff will assist local jurisdictions and ODOT District 7 with preparation of Highway Safety Applications and CEAO Safety Applications if needed. CCSTCC Staff will continue to be engaged in and support local highway safety outreach events.

CCSTCC Staff will prepare a Local Roadway Safety Program based upon the three most recent years of crash data available. High hazard locations will be identified using methodology that prioritizes locations based upon frequency, severity, and type of crashes. CCSTCC Staff will prepare abbreviated highway safety studies for corridors and intersections on an as-needed basis. Abbreviated studies will include crash data and diagramming for a three-year period and recommendations on countermeasures for safety issues identified.

Alternative Transportation

CCSTCC Staff will align RTPO planning activities with the statewide bicycle and pedestrian plan, Walk.Bike.Ohio. Active transportation strategies will be advanced to integrate into the region's long and short range transportation plans, programs, and projects.

CCSTCC Staff will continue work on development and regional integration of Logan and Champaign Counties' multi-use trails system and will promote bicycling and walking as alternative modes of transportation.

CCSTCC Staff will work with local cities, villages, townships, school districts, and ODOT District 7 on developing School Travel Plans through the Safe Routes to Schools program as the need arises.

CCSTCC Staff will conduct additional transportation alternatives planning activities. CCSTCC Staff will work with local cities, villages, and townships on their respective central business district streetscape plans.

Local Coordination

CCSTCC Staff will coordinate with and participate in local transportation planning activities with the LUC Regional Planning Commission, elected officials, freight providers, transit agencies, law enforcement, health departments, school districts, and other local agencies as stakeholders in the transportation planning process.

CCSTCC Staff will complete an Environmental Justice Analysis. The analysis will identify residential, employment, and transportation patterns of low-income and minority populations so that their needs can be identified and addressed, with the goal of a fair distribution of the benefits and burdens of transportation investments.

CCSTCC Staff will coordinate with LUC Staff on the preparation of a Title VI Self Assessment for FY25.

CCSTCC Staff will lead the effort to update the LUC Public Participation Plan.

As a regular activity CCSTCC Staff will work with LUC on the development of the following fiscal year Planning Work Program.



METHODOLOGY

Growth and development indicators, socio-economic data, and the physical characteristics of the transportation system are monitored through data collection and analysis. Data collected from various sources are reviewed, analyzed, evaluated, and compared to forecasts to determine if the various assumptions of the planning program are still valid, in order to ensure that effective transportation improvement projects are being programmed.

CCSTCC Staff will continue work mapping transportation data and preparing exhibits. Transportation data will be used in transit and paratransit planning, land use planning, roadway safety planning, long range transportation plan, etc.

Information on the physical and operating conditions of the existing transportation system will be collected. Data on traffic crashes, parking, and roadway characteristics will be collected, analyzed, and updated. CCSTCC Staff will collect data regarding operation and maintenance of the existing transportation system.

CCSTCC Staff will continue compiling traffic count files through the continuing collection of traffic data. CCSTCC Staff will coordinate with ODOT to identify HPMS & safety locations as needed. CCSTCC Staff will work with local jurisdictions to begin the collection of multiuse trail counts on locations throughout the planning area.





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Introduction

Background

The Commission was formed primarily as a result of the announcement by Governor Rhodes and The Ohio State University Officials that the Transportation Research Center of Ohio would be located straddling the Logan and Union County Line. This 8,100-acre facility was touted to be the world's largest automotive research center. Several studies indicated that a lot of growth and development would take place around the TRC, which would result in an influx of people, business, and industry. Therefore, local officials felt that a Planning Commission should be formed to start planning for the orderly development of the three counties.

The Commission elected Eugene Amrine from Marysville as its first president. The Commission met at the Masonic Temple in North Lewisburg on a monthly basis during 1967 and 1968. The Ohio Department of Development, Division of Planning, under the direction of Paul Baldridge and Patrick Meeker contracted with L-U-C as the consultant to develop the first Comprehensive Plan for the three counties. This effort took two years to complete.

The first office for the Commission was located in a former residence along US Route 33 on the site of the TRC. Carmen Scott of Bellefontaine was hired as the recording secretary in April 1968 to take minutes of the monthly meetings. In November 1968 the Commission decided to hire a full-time director and Carmen was selected from eight applicants for the position. The monthly meetings were then moved to the Masonic Temple in East Liberty. In 1970 the office was moved into the west half of the East Liberty Restaurant Building. It remained there until August 1972, when it moved into the former Knights of Pythias building in East Liberty. In 2017, the office moved to the James A. Rhodes Conference Center at TRC. During the early 1970's, the Commission met on a quarterly basis at various locations throughout the three counties. In the mid- 1970's, the Commission began having annual meetings at the Ohio Hi-Point Joint Vocational School. Between 2003 and 2016, the Commission's annual meeting rotated between the three counties, and it is now held at the Conference Center.

The membership in the Commission is determined by the by-laws. Participating villages, cities, and counties are permitted to have a certain number of representatives. The first village to become a member was North Lewisburg in March 1967, followed by St. Paris, Quincy, DeGraff, and Richwood. In 1986 other municipalities began to join. The first township to join the Commission was Liberty Township, Union County in September 1967. Over the year all 43 townships have become members. As a result, there are 95 people representing the various political subdivisions on the Regional Planning Commission. An Executive Committee consisting of 24 people is elected from the general membership at the Annual Meeting. This committee meets monthly and is the decision and policy making group for the Commission.

The Commission is charged under Ohio Law with certain responsibilities. Among them are the review and approval of subdivisions located in the unincorporated areas and the review and recommendation to township zoning commissions concerning zoning amendments. The Commission also acts as an Area-Wide Clearinghouse for applicants who request federal and state assistance for selected projects. Assistance is rendered to township and municipal zoning and planning commissions regarding zoning and subdivision development.

The Commission and several of its members have been actively involved in the attraction of new business and industry to the area and in the improvement of US Route 33, 68 and other infrastructure improvements. The Commission is funded by the villages, cities, and townships of the three counties and by the three counties themselves on a per capita basis.

Organization of the Regional Planning Commission

The Regional Planning Commission is composed of one member from each of the three boards of county commissioners and the county engineers of each county. In addition, six county "members-at-large" are appointed by the boards of county commissioners, two from each county. Nine "citizen members-at-large" are appointed by the boards of county commissioners, three from each county. Municipalities of city status have two representatives and an alternate. Participating villages have one representative and an alternate. Participating townships have one representative.

The LUC Office has moved from the center of East Liberty back to TRC. Currently, there are three counties, four cities, 18 incorporated villages and 41 townships listed as members of the commission.

The Executive Committee is presently comprised of the president, first and second vice presidents, secretary, treasurer and twenty-five other people who were elected from the entire membership at the annual meeting. Ex-officio members without voting privileges include the District Deputy Directors of the Ohio Department of Transportation's Districts Six and Seven and any chairman of a Study Committee who is not an elected member of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee is the policy and decision-making body, but their actions are always subject to review by the entire commission at any annual or special meeting.

The Executive Committee meets the second Thursday of each month at 1:15 pm in the LUC office at TRC. Representatives from any of the member municipalities or townships are always welcome to attend any or all meetings and participate in any discussion. They are, however, not permitted to vote as a member of the Executive Committee unless they are a duly elected member thereof. Minutes of all Executive Committee meetings are available to all members.

The Annual Meeting of the entire membership is held the third Thursday of November in the evening. The Annual Meeting typically consists of a dinner prior to the business portion of the meeting. All representatives are encouraged to attend this meeting and participate in any discussion and vote on any issue.

Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO)

In July 2013, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) initiated a Regional Transportation Planning Organization (RTPO) two-year pilot program with five multi-county planning organizations including LUC. The RTPO planning area covers only Logan and Champaign Counties even though this RTPO is identified as (LUC). This pilot program provided LUC with funding to conduct regional transportation planning in coordination with local stakeholders, Ohio Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO's), and ODOT. Federal transportation guidance encourages RTPO's to enhance rural area local governments' participation in "the planning, coordination, and implementation of statewide strategic long-range transportation plans and transportation improvement programs."

The initial focus of the RTPO planning program was to establish the first ever long range multi-modal transportation plans for these regions, develop transportation databases, and become knowledgeable about local government transportation funding programs. On January 27, 2016, Governor John Kasich formally designated LUC as an Ohio RTPO. This designation formalizes the program that started as a pilot and will help spur better and more informed transportation decision making in Ohio.

CCSTCC has been conducting the metropolitan transportation planning process as the MPO for the Springfield urbanized area since 1964. The current staff has a broad mix of experience across multiple transportation planning disciplines and will be able to provide that expertise to LUC and its staff. As an MPO, CCSTCC will be able to provide LUC with templates for many planning activities common between MPO's and RTPO's, including short and long range plans. These plans are captured in the work elements of this document. Both LUC and CCSTCC benefit from this interregional cooperation, and believe it can be a statewide model for sharing and bolstering resources.

As the RTPO, LUC will carry out the cooperative, comprehensive, and continuing transportation planning process via planning services provided by CCSTCC. LUC will maintain this planning process through the work elements developed annually in the Planning Work Program (PWP). The PWP describes the work necessary to maintain the transportation planning process and serves as the budgeting mechanism. The transportation planning process implemented through the PWP will be used to address the goals and objectives as defined in LUC's 2023 Long Range Transportation Plan:

Transportation Safety

- Improve and maintain safety of the roadway network, reducing the number of crashes in the area and striving to fall within the nation's average range of crash data.
 - o Identify high crash areas
 - Identify traffic enforcement target areas
 - Create and implement a signage plan to assist in wayfinding, speed regulation, and traffic control
 - Evaluate existing signage for conformance to current standards in high crash areas (intersection and curves)

Network Connectivity, Reliability & Efficiency

- Evaluate and improve the highway network to promote safe, reliable, and efficient travel for all road users.
 - o Evaluate crash data and traffic volume to identify areas of improvement
 - Evaluate the need for additional infrastructure at intersections with high traffic volumes
 - Assess local congestion and discuss infrastructure improvements
 - o Perform feasibility study of congestion alleviation opportunities
 - o Preserve and maintain the existing transportation network
 - Electric vehicles Study alternative fuel projects

Multimodal Access

- Improve and expand the public transportation network and non-motorized transportation options to allow easy mobility to all residents and visitors.
 - o Create a comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan for the two counties
 - o Identify bicycle-pedestrian connections within activity centers such as schools, hospitals, shopping areas, universities, etc.
 - Evaluate trip data for current public transportation.

Economic Vitality

- Improve economic growth in the region by providing transportation options that support existing businesses and encourage new economic development opportunities.
 - Ensure that large manufacturing businesses in the region have adequate access to the freight infrastructure network.

- Facilitate the movement of goods into and out of the area and improve the mobility of all freight modes. Identify locations for new Railroad yards.
- Employee to work transportation.

Stewardship

• Commit to the future and longevity of the transportation network by evaluating the social, environmental, and financial circumstances surrounding each project.

Overview

The Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) is a four-year planning document developed to reflect the investment priorities of the Statewide Transportation Improvement Programs (STIP) for the LUC Transportation Planning Region. This document also serves to reflect the continuing, cooperative planning effort to advance the transportation needs of the region. It is a comprehensive and financially-constrained listing of regional transportation projects scheduled for implementation within the next four years. The program of projects included in the RTIP maintains a balance of local and regional needs and includes projects from all modes of transportation including highways, transit, rail, bicycles, and pedestrians.

The RTIP is developed at least once every four years in conjunction with the STIP development process and consistent with the long-range plan. During rural consultation, which is an important step of the STIP/RTIP development process, LUC serves as the regional voice to coordinate and identify regional transportation needs for consideration of inclusion in the STIP and RTIP. LUC continues the coordination with ODOT and the MPO's within the region to provide a comprehensive RTIP document that is made available for public comment during the STIP/RTIP Public Involvement Period. Public comments are addressed and coordinated within the RTIP. The final RTIP is adopted by the LUC Executive Committee and then included in ODOT's STIP by reference.

Performance Measures

MAP-21 and FAST Act worked to incorporate performance-based planning into the transportation planning and programming process. Established were seven (7) national transportation goals for the Federal-Aid highway system to advance the interest of the United States and its transportation system. These national goals are:

- Safety To achieve a significant reduction in traffic fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads.
- 2. **Infrastructure Condition** To maintain the highway infrastructure asset system in a state of good repair.
- 3. **Congestion Reduction** To achieve a significant reduction in congestion on the National Highway System.
- 4. System Reliability To improve the efficiency of the surface transportation system.
- Freight Movement and Economic Vitality To improve the national freight network, strengthen the ability of rural communities to access national and international trade markets, and support regional economic development.
- 6. **Environmental Sustainability** To enhance the performance of the transportation system while protecting and enhancing the natural environment.
- 7. **Reduced Project Delivery Delays** To reduce project costs, promote jobs and economy, and expedite the movement of people and goods by accelerating project completion

through eliminating delays in the project development and delivery process, including reducing regulatory burdens and improving agencies' work practices.

The targets established for the performance measures were a cooperative effort between ODOT, the MPO's, and the RTPO's. Please refer to ODOT's <u>Transportation System Performance Report</u> for additional information.

The following is a list of the federally required transportation measures applicable to the LUC region (see 23 CFR 490). LUC works with ODOT and other local transportation partners to ensure transportation projects are selected to effectively address the transportation measures.

PM1: Safety Performance Measures

Federal Rule 23 CFR 490.207 requires states to establish five safety performance measures and set targets for those measures to demonstrate fata and serious injury reductions on all public roads. Listed below shows the safety performance measures, baselines, and targets. These measures are evaluated on a 5-year rolling average.

Baselines used to set are (CY2019-2023):

- 1,228.2 fatalities
- 7,790.5 serious injuries

PM3: Travel Time Reliability

Environmental Justice

Environmental Justice (EJ) is included to identify and address the effects of all programs or activities of Federal-aid recipients, sub-recipients, and contractors, whether or not such programs and activities are federally assisted.


The goal of Environmental Justice is to ensure that any adverse human health or environmental effects of any government activities do not disproportionately affect minority or low-income populations. EJ does not intend to provide preferential treatment to these populations, but rather fair treatment to all populations. Specific to transportation, EJ is to ensure that all federally funded transportation-related programs, policies, and activities that have the potential to cause adverse effects, specifically consider the effects on minority and low-income populations. EJ has the potential to improve the quality of life for those whose interests have traditionally been overlooked.

According to the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT), there are three core principles of Environmental Justice:


- To avoid, minimize, or mitigate disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects, including social and economic effects, on minority and low-income populations.
- To ensure the full and fair participation by all potentially affected communities in the transportation decision-making process.
- To prevent the denial of, reduction in or significant delay in the receipt of benefits by minority and low-income populations.

As Logan-Union-Champaign Regional Planning Commission, the LUC Transportation Plan and RTIP must address EJ concerns. Addressing Environmental Justice concerns includes:

- Identifying low-income and minority populations so that their needs can be identified and addressed and that the benefits as well as the burdens of transportation investments can be fairly distributed throughout the planning area.
- Enhancing existing analyses processes to ensure that the Transportation Plan and RTIP comply with the Title VI requirements.
- Evaluating the existing public involvement processes and improve if necessary to include minority and low-income populations in the decision-making process.

Title VI Compliance

LUC acknowledges the importance of ensuring that everyone has the opportunity to be involved in the region's transportation planning process, regardless of their background or abilities. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 states that "No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance". As a recipient of federal funding and as required by Title VI, LUC has adopted the following non-discrimination policy:

It is the policy of LUC to provide an environment of non-discrimination and equal opportunity in employment as well as in the development of Logan and Champaign County's transportation policies, plans and programs included in the Long Range transportation Plan, Transportation Improvement Program, Planning Work Program and all plans, policies and programs contained within.

Annually, LUC assures the planning process is carried out in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 U.S.C. 2000d1) and 49 CFR, part 21. Self-certification will be achieved with Executive Committee acceptance of the Title VI Plan and each subsequent Plan update.

Any person who believes that he or she has been excluded from participation in or has been denied the benefits or services of any program administered by LUC, on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender, age, disability or income status may file a complaint of discrimination under Title VI, other non-discrimination statutes, and executive orders. A complaint may be filed directly with LUC, the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) or the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). You may refer to LUC's Title VI Program Policy & Procedure document for additional information and any related forms and procedures.

LUC embraces diversity and inclusivity and provides an environment of non-discrimination. The SFY2026-2029 RTIP planning process was conducted with these important considerations in mind and is compliant with all Title VI regulations and requirements.

ADA Compliance

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) prohibits discrimination based on disability and requires all public agencies to provide safe, equal access to their programs, activities and facilities. LUC values the input of all the region's residents into the transportation planning process, and took the following measures to ensure that everyone, regardless of their abilities, could access and engage in the SFY2026-2029 RTIP planning process:

Outreach measures and physical accommodations to ensure meaningful access of those protected by ADA requirements are listed below:

- Holding meetings at ADA-compliant facilities
- Availability of ADA compliant parking
- Available accommodations for the visually or hearing impaired

LUC carefully considered the needs of all of our region's residents throughout the SFY2026-2029 RTIP planning process, meeting or exceeding all ADA requirements.

Public Involvement

A key component of the RTIP development process is to have a proactive public involvement review and comment process associated with this program. Public review was conducted following the public involvement policies LUC adopted within their Public Participation Plan in 2020.

In accordance with the guidelines of the Public Participation Plan, the following public involvement activities have/will take place:

- September 9, 2024 STIP Rural Consultation Meeting
- STIP/RTIP Public Involvement
 - o March 19, 2025 LUC Regional Planning Commission
 - March 11-April 11, 2025 STIP Public Involvement Period

A STIP Rural Consultation meeting was held on September 9, 2024 at the West Liberty Village Opera House. ODOT District 7 staff gave a brief presentation for those in attendance and took any questions or comments. Project maps and lists for each county were provided for those in attendance. Seventeen people attended the Rural Consultation and zero comments were received during the public comment period.

One public open house was held on March 19, 2025 at the LUC Regional Planning Commission to provide the draft RTIP document to the public for comment. Copies of the draft document, maps, and project lists were made available. One person attended the public open house, and no comments were received during the public involvement period which was held from March 17 through March 31, 2025. The public open house and public involvement period was advertised by legal ads in the Urbana Daily Citizen and the Bellefontaine Examiner, along with fliers posted in several government buildings. The draft document was posted on LUC's website for review and comment.

Projects

There are specific federal and state requirements for projects to be included in the STIP and TIP. US DOT requires all projects to be financed whole or in part with federal surface transportation funds, projects requiring a federal approval action, and other regionally significant projects to be included. All projects in the TIP must also be consistent with Ohio's Long Range Transportation Plan or LUC's 2023 Long Range Transportation Plan. Additional information may be found in Title 23 Chapter 1 Subchapter E Part 450 of the code of federal regulations.

The listing of all highway and transit projects programmed for funding for the SFY2026-2029 RTIP cycle can be found in *Appendix A* and *Appendix B*. Maps of the locations of the projects in Logan and Champaign Counties can be found in *Appendix C*.

SLI Grouped Projects

Projects not considered to be of appropriate scale for individual identification in a given year may be grouped by category or program. These projects are grouped and identified in the STIP and TIP's as SLI Grouped Projects. The projects utilizing SLI's are non-controversial in nature, have an air-quality status of exempt, have a negligible environment impact, will not add capacity to the existing system, and have a total project cost below \$30.0 million. The grouped project list is a fluid document and is for informational purposes only. Title 23 Chapter 1 Subchapter E Part 450 Subpart B §450.218 (j) may be referenced for the provision of grouped projects in the STIP/RTIP as named by ODOT.


Regionally Significant Projects

As a part of LUC's 2023 LUC Long Range Transportation Plan, projects from around the region were submitted by Champaign County, Logan County, City of Bellefontaine, City of Urbana, West Liberty, North Lewisburg, and Simon Kenton Bike Trail. Fiscal Constraint Analysis

For a project to be included in the RTIP and STIP per federal regulations, reasonable fiscal constraint must be maintained. Fiscal constraint is maintained by keeping estimated transportation improvements within reasonably anticipated budgets. The ODOT STIP addresses the fiscal constraint for projects included in the RTIP, financed with ODOT controlled funding sources.




2026-2029 Logan County Projects
